ANNUAL NARRATIVE ASSESSMENT REPORT FY 2022

SOCIAL TECHNOLOGY UNIT

I. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

As the Social Technology Bureau's regional counterpart, the Social TechnologTechnologiesists in developing, enhancing, and promoting social welfare and development (SWD) services and programs for and with the country's poor, weak, and disadvantaged citizens. The Unit carries out creative projects and programs aimed at enhancing the social conditions and social functioning of vulnerable groups, particularly those in need of Mental Health and Psychosocial Support, People Who Use Drugs, Street Dwellers, as well as Indigenous people, particularly Sama Bajaus, and focused its activities in providing technical assistance and support to the Local Government Units in implementing the replicated Social Technologies.

The Comprehensive Program for Street Children, Street Families, and Indigenous Peoples, especially Sama-Bajaus, continued its implementation to provide at-risk children and families with a complete combination of services, interventions, and chances to live in a safer environment. Furthermore, the program also focuses on capacitating the LGUs through training, learning sessions, and a series of workshops in anticipation of the program's devolution.

The unit also aimed to intensify its social marketing activities to encourage more LGUs to signify their interest in the replication of various social technologies in their locality, among which are the Yakap Bayan Program and Reporting System of Abuses and Protection for Elderly Persons.

II. ASSESSMENT OF PHYSICAL AND FINANCIAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A. Narrative Accomplishment

1. *Comprehensive Program for Street Children, Street Families including Indigenous People.*

Reach-out to Stranded Sama Bajau Individual and Families	On January 15, 2022, Comprehensive Program staff facilitated the stranded Sama bajaus at North Port Area Manla in coordination with Manila Department of Social Welfare (MDSW). The 95 out of 101 Sama bajaus were vaccinated and tested negative for antigen test facilitated by DOH in compliance to the mandated protocols and requirements during pandemic. They were provided. With the combined efforts of the Philippine Port Area (PPA), Manila Department of Social Welfare (MDSW), Manila Health Department (MHD), Department of Social Welfare and Development – National Capital Region (DSWD-NCR), the following are the assistance such as financial assistance, food and non food items were also provided to them. On January 24, 2022, the 101 Sama Bajaus was facilitated to

of January 2023. The late travel was due to unavailability of vehicle schedules bound to Zamboanga, another postponement of travel will be subjecting from the Phil. Port Authority's advisory due to the typhoon.

III. ISSUES AND CONCERNS

1. Insufficient documentation of actual experiences on the implementation of social technologies that can facilitate the replication of STs to LGUs.
2. Need to develop proper tagline and advocacy messaging that would encourage the LGUs and partners to replicate the ST programs.
3. Lack of personnel that will focus on the monitoring and enhancement of program replication and adoption of ST programs in the LGUs.
4. Lack of Advocacy materials and operation manuals that will support the program implementation.
5. Lack of a Pool of Resource Persons that will assist in the marketing and promotion of the ST projects
6. Limited allocation as a start up budget for the replication of ST projects.
7. More time and engagement on the operationalization of the Comprehensive program for F/CISS.

IV. WAYS FORWARD

1. Intensification of Marketing and Promotion of Completed Social Technology Projects among LGUs, NGOs and NGAs.
2. To conduct consultation workshops with BJMP, Regional Court, Rehabilitation and Treatment facilities and MADAQ to explore proper protocol and clear process flow on the endorsement and referral of clients for After Care through Yakap Bayan Program.
3. Conduct localized Idea Workshop at the Regional Level to generate more inputs on the enhancement of program development.

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
